History Lesson - Frontiero v. Richardson

Do you know a military woman who is married to a civilian? You may have even been one yourself. Today spouses, whether male or female, are "dependents" in the eyes of the military, but that wasn't always the case.

Before 1973, civilian men who married military women did not automatically receive an ID card with all of its benefits. Military rules at the time required women to prove that their husbands were "dependent" on them, meaning they provided more than half of the household income. However, military men married to civilian women were not subject to this requirement and were entitled to an increased housing allowance, as well as dental and medical benefits for their wives.

That is until Air Force Lieutenant Sharron Frontiero sued the military after being denied housing and medical benefits for her civilian husband. Although she earned more than her husband's monthly veteran's stipend, he did not receive more than half his support from her; therefore, she was denied the additional benefits given to married military members.

"I was married, and I expected a housing allowance, and I wasn't eligible for it — because I was a woman," Sharron, 73, said in a StoryCorps interview.

After initially losing at the state level, her lawyer teamed up with the ACLU Women's Rights Project who took it to the Supreme Court. Frontiero v. Richardson was argued before the Supreme Court by none other than Ruth Bader Ginsburg. It was her first case before the Court, and this landmark case was the first successful sex discrimination case against the federal government. The women and men in our armed forces are better off thanks to someone saying, "This is wrong."

Six Triple Eight



In case you didn't see Lorraine's email, you need to see this movie. The *Six Triple Eight* movie premiered on Netflix on 20 December. I remember seeing this photo in a MWM calendar, and I've had it on my desk for 10 years. I share their story with everyone, and now Tyler Perry is sharing it with the world.

Almost a century after the end of World War II, new stories about the quiet heroism of everyday individuals continue to come to light. Now Tyler Perry is tackling the war with his new film *The Six Triple Eight*, the story of the war's only Women's Army Corps unit of color, which stars Kerry Washington.

The 6888th Central Postal Directory Battalion contributed to the war effort in a unique way: by sorting through a three-year backlog of mail (17 million pieces of it!) that hadn't been delivered to American soldiers far from home. In the face of discrimination and a vast, unfamiliar country divided by global conflict, these 855 women brought hope to the front lines.

"A lot of people do not want us to succeed," Washington says as Captain Charity Adams in the film. "We have the most to prove."

But that's exactly what they did. Given six months to complete the task, the 6888th accomplished their mission in less than 90 days, providing morale when the United States needed it most.

"I felt like these women were with us in this process," Washington said. "You felt their spirit all the time."

Little moments throughout filming reminded the crew of their place in history. One local resident asked what the team was working on; upon learning it was a film about the Six Triple Eight, he had a contribution to make. "He pulled out a trunk and he opened it up," Washington said. "And it was my character Charity Adams' actual trunk. It had her uniforms, it had seeds from her victory garden. It had letters, it had pictures. It was unbelievable." Taken from: Tadum Neflix, John Dilillo, Nov 25, 2024

The program asks you to adopt a woman who is no longer with us and share her story to keep her story alive so that is what I plan on doing right now with a woman who always made me laugh.

Meet Joan Willauer - a WWII Marine



Joan was born in Madison, WI on November 14, 1923. She worked as a telephone operator until WWII broke out when she enlisted in the Marines and was stationed at Cherry Point, NC. She met her future husband there; Jeff was also a Marine – surprise! She was discharged in 1946 and went back to the phone company until she and Jeff married in 1947, and they lived at Camp Pendleton until he was discharged. Joan kept busy because she had eight children, but it surprised me that she didn't cook – Jeff did! She preferred to work outside in the garden and play with the kids.

Joan was full of surprises. She told me how she and the other women Marines would get up early and get dressed with full make up to watch the men march by because Tyrone Power was one of them! (You young'uns google him.) They

watched from the barracks windows, so I didn't understand why they had to have full make up, but she thought he was worth it.

Joan loved WVRD (Women Veterans Recognition Day) and was always there lending a hand and enjoying the event. We were at the Friday night social (I know we don't tell anyone what happens on Friday night, but she'll forgive me.) She had one or two beers when a gentleman asked his wife if he could get her another drink and to be polite, he asked the rest of us. Joan said she'd take another beer. He was shocked and without thinking said, "Really?!" She just smiled her cute grin and said, "Honey, I haven't been sober since 1986!" I laughed so hard at her response and the look on his face.

She always made me laugh like when she was a volunteer at the Norman Veterans Center. She was in her 90s and using a walker by then. As she was leaving the center, a new nurse tried to stop her because she thought Joan was a resident. Joan very seriously asked me, "Why would she think I was a resident?"! I answered that I had no idea why she would think that and laughed.

Joan passed away on May 21, 2022, but she will always live in my heart as truly one of the greatest from our "greatest generation."
